- Periodic recruitment




Our Goals



We work with our advisory boards to:


- Develop topics for tip sheets and briefs

Design and Execution of KT Projects

- The YAB Meme Project
- The YAB conceptualized and executed a series of young adult-friendly memes
- Produced 70 memes, surpassing project goal of 60

Design and Execution of KT Projects, cont.

- ABLE Tip Sheet
 - Conceptualized topic
 - Provided feedback on content, images, language used, end-product, final pass
- Disclosure Tip Sheet
 - Modified to help determine the salient issues for young adults that are not realized by researchers




The "Achieving a Better Life Experience" Act, or ABLE Act, is a federal law that was passed in 2014. It gives people who have a disability a way to save money. This landmark legislation offers people living with disabilities, including those with serious mental health conditions, a chance to pursue their hopes and dreams in a realistic way without as many financial obstacles.

Why is ABLE a big deal for me?

The ABLE Act is important for young adults living with mental health conditions because it allows them to save money for "qualifying expenses" such as a car, college, training, healthcare, prevention and wellness, and other eligible expenses without being taxed by the government. Such opportunities can allow you to have more independence and a better quality of life. An ABLE account is an easier way to access your savings compared to other types of savings accounts.

- You can put up to \$14,000 a year into your ABLE account.
- If you are a Supplemental Security Income (SSI)



What Should I Say About My Mental Health Condition at Work?

Every young adult with a mental health condition will face the decision of whether or not to tell others about, or "disclose" their condition at work. Typically the reason for disclosure is to ask for an accommodation in order to perform better at your present job. An accommodation is modifying a job, the job site, or the way things are done in order to enable a qualified individual with a disability to have an equal opportunity for employment.¹ The following information can provide some guidance in helping you make an informed decision.

Your Next Steps



- There is no “one size fits all” solution for community engagement in different organizations.
