What is Sexuality?

Sexuality is an integral part of the personality of everyone..[..]; it is a basic need and aspect of being human that cannot be separated from other aspects life. It influences thoughts, feelings, action and interactions and thereby our mental and physical health.

Sexuality can **intersect** with other identities, such as disability.

Disability & Sexuality

- Young people with disabilities have the right to access information about sexuality.
- Young people with disabilities have the same hopes and desires for sex and relationships as non-disabled peers.
- The importance of sexuality is often not recognized by teachers, parents and healthcare providers.

A 3-year initiative funded by the Social Sciences and Humanities Research Council (SSHRC) Partnership Development Grant with the goal of better supporting the sexuality of disabled youth and building capacity across organizations in Canada

Youth Advisory Councils

Junior Group

Aged 12–17 years old, identify as having a disability, and interested in discussion disability and sexuality. This group currently has 3 members.

Senior Group

Aged 18–30 years old, identify as having a disability, and interested in discussing disability and sexuality. This group currently has 6 members.
