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



Patient Oriented Research... What is it?

- "A continuum of research that engages patients as partners, focusses on patient-identified priorities and improves patient outcomes." (Canadian Institutes of Health Research, 2019).
 - 'Patients' include individuals with lived experience of a health condition and their informal caregivers, including family and friends.

What Did We Find Lacking in Research

One of the Main things that we found lacking in when partnering in research was an understanding of the importance of accessibility and therefore also the knowledge on how to provide that accessibility.

- We (Jessica, Amanda and Danny) were given the opportunity to take McMaster University's Family Engagement in Research (FER) Micro-Credential Course.
- The ongoing task of the course is to create a KT tool that highlights research partnerships/research process etc. as a group.
- In part due to our experience with the Youth Engagement in Research project we decided to make an accommodation booklet.


What Is It and How to Use It?

- Plain language



- Provision of documents to all.






